- Designed and conducted more than 150 distinct training sessions with a total of 3,100 attendees, including New Jersey state staff members and other stakeholders, in 18 months.

Maximizing CDBG-DR Funds for Community Rebuilding

Need

When Superstorm Sandy hit in October 2012, New Jersey's local and state governments were faced with the monumental task of responding to the immediate, critical needs of citizens while establishing a comprehensive, long-term recovery process.

In March 2013, the federal government allocated funding for Sandy recovery, but assigning these resources as quickly and effectively as possible required expert guidance in the management of Community Disaster Block Grant Disaster Recovery (CDBG-DR) funds. New Jersey needed to know how to:

- Best use the resources available to balance competing priorities with speed
- Stand up the functions and programs required for recovery
- Remain compliant with Federal regulations and reporting requirements

The cost of non-compliance would compound an already dire situation and add to the risk that the state would not be able to fund important recovery efforts for its communities.

Solution

While housing was a primary concern, more than 20 programs were ultimately established across all sectors to promote recovery, resumption of business, long-term sustainability, and improved resilience. ICF's 25 years of work with the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) gave them the experience and expertise to help New Jersey staff navigate the CDBG-DR and Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) requirements. After an initial advisory role, ICF's responsibilities were expanded to provide a full suite of end-to-end services.
