COVID-19 Federal Funding

State and local entities responding to the COVID-19 pandemic are responsible for managing a number of funding sources in response to the CARES Act that can be used to help address some of the needs and challenges their communities are facing. The following table is a point-in-time summary of just some of those programs and eligible costs according to their publicly available websites. As each agency continues to share guidance and more information becomes available this table will need to be updated to reflect those changes. Deliver meals on wheels to quarantined individuals or individuals that need to maintain social distancing due to medical vulnerabilities. Unless waived by HUD, a percentage of funding must meet the requirement of benefiting low-and-moderate income (LMI) areas or persons/households.

HRSA: COVID-19 Claims Reimbursement to Care **Providers for Testing & Treatment of the Uninsured**

Reimbursement for qualifying testing for COVID-19 and treatment services with a primary COVID-19 diagnosis as determined by HRSA (subject to adjustment as may be necessary), including:

- Specimen collection, diagnostic and antibody testing.
- Testing-related visits, including office, urgent care or emergency room, or telehealth settings.
- Treatment, including:
 - Office visit (including telehealth), emergency room, inpatient, outpatient/observation, skilled nursing facility, long-term acute care (LTAC), acute inpatient rehab, home health
 - Durable Medical Equipment (DME) -e.g., oxygen, ventilator
 - Emergency ambulance transportation, non-emergent patient transfers via ambulance
 - FDA-approved drugs as they become available for COVID-19 treatment and administered as part of an inpatient stay
- FDA-approved vaccine, when available.

Claims will be subject to Medicare timely filing requirements. Services not covered by traditional Medicare will also not be covered under this program. In addition, the following services are

- Any treatment without a COVID-19 primary diagnosis, except for pregnancy when the COVID-19 code may be listed as secondary.
- Hospice services.
- Outpatient prescription drugs.

All claims submitted must be complete and final.

- Purchase and distribution/use of medical supplies & equipment including:
 - In vitro diagnostic supplies
 - Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) including respirators, N95 respirators, medical gloves, surgical masks, medical gowns, coveralls, face shields
 - Other PPE, description must be provided
- Decontamination systems
- Ventilators and products modified for use as ventilators
- Therapeutics
- Provision of medical services including:
 - Disease testing
 - Treatment
 - Diagnosis
 - Medical transport
 - Medical waste disposal
- Enhanced medical facilities including:
 - Alternate care sites or other temporary medical facilities
 - Expansion of capacity within a medical facility
 - Community-based testing sites

FEMA IA: For COVID-19, Individual Assistance also includes payments to providers of services for shelter and crisis counseling.

Assistance to Businesses

HUD: CDBG-CV

SBA: Paycheck Protection Program (PPP)

- Provide grants or loans to support new businesses or business expansion to create jobs and manufacture medical supplies necessary to respond to infectious disease.
- Avoid job loss caused by business closures related to social distancing by providing short-term working capital
 assistance to small businesses to enable retention of jobs held by low- and moderate-income (LMI) persons.
- Provide technical assistance, grants, loans, and other financial assistance to establish, stabilize, and expand
 microenterprises that provide medical, food delivery, cleaning, and other services to support home health and
 quarantine.

Payroll costs, and most mortgage interest, rent, and utilities for 8 weeks after funding is approved.

Planning, Capacity Building, and Technical Assistance:

- Grant funds to units of general local government may be used for planning activities in conjunction with an activity
 - May also be used for planning only as an activity
 - Activities must meet or demonstrate that they would meet a national objective
 - Are subject to the State's 20% administration, planning and technical assistance cap
- Grant funds to units of general local government to hire technical assistance providers to deliver CDBG training
 to new subrecipients and local government departments that are administering CDBG funds for the first time to
 assist with infectious disease response. This activity is subject to the State's 3 percent administration, planning
 and technical assistance cap.
- Gather data and develop non-project-specific emergency infectious disease response plans.
